Spotlight: July

Citizenship Act's Impact on Assam and BJP's Clever Election Gimmick

The BJP government got the Citizen Amendment Act (CAA) passed from the parliament on 12 December 2019. The Act amended the 1955 Citizenship Act to offer citizenship to illegal migrants belonging to Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis, and Christians from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, and Pakistan arriving in India before December 2014. The Act, therefore, clearly deprives the similarly eligible Muslims from the privilege. The bill was presented before a 30-member Parliamentary Select Committee back in 2016 and after the parliamentary process, it was enacted into a law. This act reduces the requirement for citizenship from 11 years to 6 years and grants fast-track and easy-to-access Indian citizenship to non-Muslims immigrants from three Islamic states.

Spotlight: July

The Rise of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and Future of Indian National Congress (INC)

The Bhartiya Janata Party (BJP) emerged as a popular political party following Narendra Modi's first term in the office. The party managed to secure another term, leaving the Congress with a seemingly irredeemable defeat. The BJP won a staggering 303 seats in the 545-member parliament, acquiring 50 per cent of the vote in its bid to establish itself as the sole national party across India. Meanwhile, the main opposition party, The Indian National Congress (INC) managed to win a meagre 52 seats. While the Modi-led BJP continues its march forward, the INC, i.e., the grand old party which led the nation through independence from the British colonial rule seems to be on its way to an inevitable decline.

Spotlight: August

Low Voter Turnout in Iranian Elections 2021

Elections of 2021 had the lowest voter turnout since the Iranian revolution in 1979. The turnout was considerably low as compared to the previous elections of 2017 which Mr. Raisi had lost. Ebrahim Raisi, a conservative, principlist and former Chief justice was elected as the new president of Iran. 590 applicants registered for elections, only seven were selected. Not even a single woman was among them. The world already thinks that Iranian political system is not democratic. There were plenty of reasons for the low turnout while internationally it was just considered one. Low turnout made the 2021 elections suspicious and definitely affected its credibility.

Spotlight: August End of Afghan Conflict?

Celebrations continue across Afghanistan as well as in some parts of the region in the wake of United States withdrawal. The end game in Afghanistan, however, has different meanings to different people. For the Taliban, it is a victory. It is a defeat of the United States. ¹ The fall of a superpower that long kept the Taliban away from running the country on their terms. For many Afghans, it is freedom, a joyous moment as their country is liberated after decades-long foreign occupation. Similarly, there are mixed views at the regional level. For religious sects, Taliban's rise is indeed a beacon of hope to regain their lost ascendancy. For intelligentsia, it is a point of inflection, a glare opportunity to instill the region-ness within the region. Many people are rather deeply sceptical about the peaceful coexistence of the people and the societies belonging to different ideologies. The purpose here is not to contemplate how various segments of the society view US pull-out and Taliban's ascendancy but to shed light on underlying three broad narratives that continue to shape up the minds of the people across the globe.

Spotlight: September China's Greater Role in Afghanistan in Post-Withdrawal Environment

China paid close attention to the changing political and security conditions of Afghanistan during the military exit of the United States from the war-torn country. Amid the fragile peace negotiation and with the collapse of Ashraf Ghani's regime, the country invited a lot of attention from the region as well as from the entire world. China also showed its concerns over the changed scenario and so vowed its pledge to respect and support the political settlement between the Taliban and other political stakeholders in Kabul. China showed utmost support to the peace process among the Afghan stakeholders and now also desires to work for the reconstruction and stability of Afghanistan long with other regional and global contenders. China does not have any historical baggage in Afghanistan and it has never sided with any of the factions or interfered in the internal political matters therein. Therefore, China can confidently partner with any of the future government(s) of Afghanistan. Moreover, Beijing's decentralised diplomatic approach is always acknowledged by stakeholders in Afghanistan. China's role in Afghanistan would also be compatible with the other neighbours of Afghanistan, especially Pakistan and the Central Asian Republics (CARs).




Regional Integration and CPEC: The Case Of Gwadar Port

‘Nuclear arms control provides lessons for other technologies





H.E. Andreas Ferrarese, Ambassador of Italy to Pakistan said in his opening statement that climate change is a shared responsibility, can be used to preserve historical heritage and boost economies via incentives for taking environmental precautions.



H.E. Dr. Christian Turner said in his opening statement that Pakistan has the tools to lead the way to show other developing economies what is possible for adaptation and mitigation of climate change



Andaleeb Abbass said in her keynote address at Precop26 from Paris to Glasgow, "Climate change is all encompassing and affects everyone regardless of who and where they are. Cooperation and coordination is the way forward."




